


Alternative 3 Iditarod National Historic Trail Portage Area

Turnagain Arm/Portage Valley Area Summary: Trail segments for Alt. 3 in Portage Valley would begin at MP79 of the Seward Highway and head east following the Trail of Blue Ice to the Begich, Boggs Visitor Center on Portage Lake. (P1-2) There would be no trail across Portage lake, and the trail would continue east over Portage Pass on the existing Portage Pass Trail (P4). A highway bike path is recommended to be constructed by DOT to extend the trail into Whittier (P5).

Alt. 3 would construct 1.3 miles of new trail, and reconstruct 2.2 miles of existing trail. 7.8 miles of trail would become part of the INHT, all available for year-round non-motorized use and winter motorized use.

Trailheads: Access to the trail in Portage Valley would be provided at five existing sites: an existing pullout at MP79 of the Seward Highway (Portage Creek bridge), at Moose Flats Day Use Area, at the Begich, Boggs Visitor Center, at Portage Pass Trailhead just east of the tunnel on the Whittier side, and at the end of the road in Whittier. Interpretive and informational signs would be installed at all sites.
